Results from the 2019-2020 Graduate Student Asso	ciation Survey
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Introduction

In fall of 2019, the Graduate Student Association (GSA) created and sent a survey to explore the climate amongst current graduate students at Baylor University. This report details the findings of the survey as well as their significance in light of national research on the topic. This report concludes with a handful of considerations for the future of graduate education at Baylor.

Method

Measures

Questionnaires were developed by the GSA cabinet for the 2016 and 2018 administrations and can be found in the 2018 report. For the 2019 administration, survey questions were added and adapted from outside research examining graduate student needs. Demographic questions were included to understand various groups' (e.g., parents) presence. Questions included close-ended and open-ended response options. The final 2019 survey can be found in Appendix 1. The survey was reviewed by the GSA faculty advisor and dean of the graduate school and the final version was completed in July 2019. All questions were imported into Qualtrics prior to dissemination.

Participants

All graduate students were sent an email from Baylor's Institutional Research and Testing Office to participate in the survey in the fall of 2019. A sample of 2,733 graduate students were invited to participate in the survey. Of this total, 683 participated for a response rate of 25.0%. This was an increase from 142 individuals in 2018 and 106 individuals in 2016.

Respondents from both surveys came from students within the graduate school (93%) and the law school (7%). Of the students within the graduate school, approximately half were master's students and half were doctoral students. Online students made up approximately 35% of respondents. Demographic information of respondents can be found in Appendix 2.

Analysis

Quantitative. Descriptive analyses were performed in SPSS (version 25). In some cases, the total number of respondents for a survey question is less than the total number of respondents for the survey as not all participants responded to all survey questions. For items that were measured on a Likert scale, certain categories were collapsed to allow for ease of interpretation. For example, "strongly agree" and "somewhat agree" would constitute a level of agreement with that particular statement.

Qualitative. To determine the most pressing concerns for graduate students, the open-ended questions were imported into NVivo, a qualitative data analysis software. Each response was coded into one or more themes from the survey (e.g., institutional support, housing). Responses were reviewed and discussed by the members of the survey subcommittee. This was to come to a consensus regarding students' feelings and identify illustrative quotes in each of the main categories.

Results

This section will outline graduate students' concerns in areas of departmental and campus resources, feelings of value and inclusion, and well-being (i.e., mental, financial).

Resources

Departmental

Teaching

A few of the comments related to departmental expectations as it relates to teaching. For example, one student said, "If Baylor wants to produce top-tier PhD students, that is not feasible with the amount of teaching and graduate assistant research most humanities PhD's (English, History, Religion are the ones I'm most familiar with) we are expected to do. The fact that we never get a single 'duty-free' year is not conducive to top-tier PhD research."

Mentorship

Student were asked if they agreed or disagreed with the two statements related to their advisors: "My advisor is a real mentor to me" and "My advisor is an asset to my academic and professional career." Most graduate students view their advisors as assets to their academic and professional career; slightly fewer students view their advisors as real mentors.




Figure 1. Perceptions of graduate students' advisors "Q23 My advisor is..."

However, students had concerns about some relationships with faculty. This can be seen in a quote from a student who said, "First and foremost, Baylor is responsible for protecting its graduate students from abuses from faculty and administration. This includes being willing to reprimand faculty, protect the academic and intellectual freedom of students, and actually take steps to right wrongs..."

Departmental integration

Most graduate students feel valued and included by their department and by those around campus.

- ■I feel like valued and included by those around campus (the administration, other faculty/students).




Figure 2. Graduate students' sentiment of value and inclusion

Many of the student concerns revolved around the administrative policies regarding sexuality. Students did not feel valued which related to their success and the success of their peers. As one student put it, "LGBTQ students and graduate students at Baylor face an additional, substantial layer of stress in their lives, preventing full devotion to their studies. Research indicates the graduate students and LGBTQ folks are all at much higher risk of mental and emotional health and economic struggles than their cis/straight/non-student counterparts. The combination of being LGBTQ (at a non-inclusive university like Baylor) *and* a graduate student is more emotionally and physically taxing than I can fully indicate in this forum." More specifically, one student stated that "There is apathy or antipathy here on campus that makes me uncomfortable in being myself, and harms my happiness at Baylor, my productivity, and my general feelings of well being. The school needs to make the choice to be fully supportive (as they should be) or just to announce publicly that LGBT students need not apply. At least then people would know for sure whether or not to apply. Until that choice is made, I never recommend to LGBT peers that they should consider Baylor for any continuing education." Other qualitative concerns related to inclusion for online students.

Campus

Housing

Students were asked whether they agreed with the following two statements: "Where I live, I feel safe." and "Where I live, I'm satisfied with my living conditions." The majority of the students agreed with both statements.




Figure 1. Feelings of safety and satisfaction where students live

Academic resources




Figure 4. Resources needed for academic success

Students were asked to respond to the question "I have the resources I need to succeed academically." As seen in Figure 4, the majority of graduate students believe they have the resources they need to succeed academically, but 6% reported not having sufficient resources for academic success.

Graduate students were asked if the graduate school resources were helpful. In general, students found the support from libraries to be very useful. Other support from counseling center, office of career and professional development, writing center, and graduate school is useful to some graduate students.




Figure 5. Usefulness of graduate school resources

Specifically, students had perspectives on improving existing campus supports. For example, "The Baylor Counseling Center is really wonderful, but they still sometimes struggle to understand how grad students might be different from undergrads. (They attempted to put me in a group with undergrads, and there obviously wasn't a way to make sure that they wouldn't be roommates or friends with one of my students.) I think continued conversations with them are important."

They also had suggestions for new programming, even if not only for graduate students. One student said, "The graduate school and BU administrators may benefit from participating in professional development in online pedagogy, instructional design for online courses and helping online graduate students feel like part of the BU community."

GSA

The following figures summarize responses to questions related to the Graduate Student Organization.

Orientation is the most attended GSA activity by the surveyed graduate students, with 43.2% of students attending orientation. Most other activities were attended by approximately 10% of the students.




Figure 6. Attendance at GSA events

The next figure shows the evaluation of GSA events among those who have attended them. All events are considered very worthwhile to attend by at least 50% of the students who participated. The most worthwhile activity would be the 3-minute Thesis competition, described as such by 72.1% of the students.




Figure 7. Assessment of GSA events among students who have attended

Students' quotes about GSA indicated that they did not know who or what GSA is and wanted more frequent communication from the group, especially in terms of events.

Well-being

In terms of student well-being, results will be divided into three sections regarding physical, mental, and financial well-being.

Physical Health

This section presents students' physical health in three domains: overall health, sleep, and safety.

Students were asked "How has your overall health been this semester?" Students' overall health conditions are generally satisfactory, though the health of approximately 8% of graduate students needs some attention.




Figure 8. Self-reported health

Students were asked to report their average sleep duration during a typical semester week. Approximately half of the graduate students do not maintain sufficient sleep (7-9 hours/day).




Figure 2. Average sleep duration per day during the semester

Safety

The main concerns for safety revolved around students' living arrangements. As an example, a student said, "Graduate students are generally very poor and frequently live in places that don't feel entirely safe."

Quantitative results show, however, that 86% of students feel safe where they live, and that 83% of them are satisfied with their living conditions. This is represented in the table below.




Figure 10. Feelings of safety and satisfaction where students live

Campus

Students were also asked if they agreed to feeling safe on campus. In general, graduate students feel safe on campus.




Figure 11. Feeling of safety on campus

Mental Health

One of the questions asked students to describe the frequency with which they've experienced symptoms related to depression. Hence, they were asked to report how often they have felt that everything they did was an effort, and also to describe how often they have had

trouble keeping their mind on what they were doing. Possible answers ranged from "A lot of the time" to "None of the time". The figure below shows that a large proportion of graduate students think everything they do takes effort and that they have trouble focusing on what they do at least sometimes.




Figure 3. Depression-related symptoms

Using the same scale as above, graduate students were also asked to rate the frequency of their hopeful and depressive feelings. Though in general, graduate students are hopeful about their future, approximately 45% of them have depressive thoughts at least sometimes.




Figure 4. Frequency of hopeful and depressive feelings

Financial Health

Students were asked whether they agreed or disagreed with three statements related to financial situations: "I'm confident about my financial situation." "I can get by financially without having to cut back on too many of the things that are important to me." and "I've been concerned about money lately."

Slightly more than half of the graduate students are confident about their financial situations. However, one-fifth of graduate students expressed concern about money lately.




Figure 5. Financial concerns of graduate students

A question related to financial health asked student how inclined they were to take on additional work in order to pay their bills. We see in the figure below that more than 80% of graduate students are willing to take some additional work to pay their bills with approximately a third of them strongly inclined to take additional work.




Figure 6. Likelihood of taking on additional work to pay bills

There were many qualitative responses from students regarding their financial well-being. These concerns were often related to communication, compensation, and success in school. In terms of communication, one student wished they knew what their financial situation would be before coming to Baylor. They said, "I wish that I had been made aware of student fees more clearly before enrolling, because as I mentioned above, I can barely afford to make ends meet with my stipend thanks to Baylor's student fees. I felt there was no clear explanation of these fees, and since I'm fresh out of undergrad with no wealth or assets and no spouse for an additional income, I don't know if financially I can afford to finish even in a fully funded spot. I

was not made aware of the additional class fee until I moved all the way here to Texas, and I honestly don't know that I would have enrolled if I knew I was barely going to make ends meet with their competitive stipends and affordable housing." Other responses indicated students wanted to know what their fees were paying for and how these resources benefited graduate students.

Similarly, one student commented on how the compensation did not match what the student had to pay for in other areas of life. They stated, "The graduate school needs to set fair and livable wages for graduate assistants, especially within departments. The administration should really do more to provide more affordable and accessible living for graduate students. They should also consider a more affordable and accessible option for graduate student parking on campus, especially when one considers the fact that graduate students are involved in a lot of necessary work on campus." Another student had similar concerns and wondered why students were not allowed to work off campus to supplement their wages. The student wanted to make ends meet, but could not without taking on additional work. They said, "The graduate school needs to allow students to be paid by Baylor and work outside of the University. If a student is still performing their research work while working an outside internship, that student should be paid for their work."

Ultimately these financial concerns were related to students feeling like they could finish their degree. As one student put it, "I'm the first in my family to go to college not to mention grad school. I didn't know any better. And I'm so terribly disappointed money will continue to impact whether I can succeed (and maybe even complete my program) in this graduate school as a single woman, straight out of undergrad, with no additional sources of income from a spouse."

Conclusions and Considerations

Findings here indicate that graduate students find value in many of the resources on campus, although many students do not use resources besides the libraries. This suggests that some units on campus- such as the counseling center and GSA- need to communicate to students regarding their graduate-specific offerings. Departmental resources results suggest students feel supported in terms of their teaching and supervision. Faculty continue to be sources of advice and support for students, and continued improvement is needed in this area as mentorship of doctoral students is one of the most widely studied and important factors impacting student experience (Sverdlik et al, 2018).

Lack of community inclusion and "fit" are large contributors to doctoral student attrition although having a positive match also benefits students' well-being and achievement (Schmidt & Hansson, 2018; Sverdlik et al, 2018). Negative environments can be especially detrimental for marginalized groups, such as those within the LGBTQ+ (Woodford et al., 2018) and international student communities (McKenna et al., 2017). Feeling of inclusion and belongingness can be promoted through cultural events and leadership programs (Glass & Westmont, 2014). Positive mentor-mentee relationships can also effectively promote sense of belongingness to the department and research teams (Levett-Jones et al., 2009). Sense of belongingness, in turn, facilitates students' academic success and mental health.

Similar to issues listed in this report, graduate students' life satisfaction and retention revolves around housing, finances, and being prepared for a career upon graduation (Graduate Assembly, 2014; Sverdlik et al, 2018). Recent research on graduate students' well-being have noted similar issues in the larger graduate student population. Some have suggested that approximately half of PhD students have difficulty with their mental health (Levecque et al., 2017), such as facing rates of anxiety and depression rates six times higher than the general population (Evans et al., 2018). These concerns of well-being not only have implications as Baylor continues to move toward higher research activity but also for the scientific community at large (Levecque et al., 2017).

As Baylor continues to work towards becoming a research-intensive university, the lives of graduate students will need to remain at the forefront. Maintaining offerings that students use and find benefit from, namely the counseling center, are recommended given the mental health concerns students face. Making changes to other campus supports, such as the career center or housing options, can better serve the financial and mental health concerns of those living in the area. Finally, working with faculty to make sure departments continue to be areas of support for all students remains crucial. Working across campus with administrators and student groups must be done in order to increase the campus inclusion efforts, especially for students in marginalized communities. By committing to and acting on the caring, Christian community, Baylor will be distinguished from other research-intensive universities.
